RATIONALE OF THE CONFERENCE

India is the second-most unequal country globally, with millionaires controlling 54% of its wealth. With a total individual wealth of \$5,600 billion, it's among the 10 richest countries in the world – and yet the average Indian is relatively poor. Compare this with Japan, the most equal country in the world, where according to the report millionaires control only 22% of total wealth.

In India, the richest 1% own 53% of the country's wealth. The richest 5% own 68.6%, while the top 10% have 76.3%. At the other end of the pyramid, the poorer half pushes for a mere 4.1% of national wealth. Things are getting better for the rich. India's richest 1% owned just 36.8% of the country's wealth in 2000, while the share of the top 10% was 65.9%. Since then they have steadily increased their share of the pie. The share of the top 1% now exceeds 50%.

Sharp rise in inequality in India is damaging, and country needs to make an effort to curb it. Rising inequality will lead to slower poverty reduction, undermine the sustainability of economic growth, compound the inequalities between men and women, and drive inequalities in health, education and life chances. "Severe income disparity" is to be one of the top global risks in the coming decade. A growing body of evidence has also demonstrated that economic inequality is associated with a range of health and social problems, such as mental illness and violent crime. This is true across both rich and poor countries, inequality hurts everyone.

In this conference, approaches to develop a systematic framework to tackle the Income Inequality will be discussed. It also aims at bringing together the Social Work professional, academicians and researchers to exchange the ideas and experiences for addressing the challenges of poverty and economic inequality.
